# **Lecture Programme**

Our 2023/24 programme was very varied, covered many different aspects of the Arts...

The programme began in September with a lecture by our President, Hugh Ellwood, on 'The Golden Age of British Watercolour'. In March, we were fortunate to have booked James Taylor, who talked about 'Grace Darling and the Fine Art of Saving Lives at Sea'. This coincided with the bicentennial celebrations of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution. We invited members of our local lifeboat station to attend this lecture which was well received by the lifeboat volunteers.

One highlight of the year was a lecture which was voted outstanding by many of our members. This was Simon Seligman's 'Debo – Mitford, Cavendish, Devonshire Duchess, Housewife, 1920-2014'. He was extremely knowledgeable about his subject and an excellent speaker. We were all captivated by his in-depth exposition and experience of working with 'Debo'.

Our visit by Rupert Dickens in May was very appropriate; he spoke about 'Political Satire: Hogarth at the Hustings' and with the General Election approaching, this was a superb introduction to the hustings and the political machinations involved.

Unfortunately, we were unable to see two of our Lecturers in person this year but thanks to the technical team at the Lowther, we were able to enjoy the lectures via the medium of the internet. Colin Shindler was unable to travel due to a train strike, but using Zoom gave us an excellent and entertaining talk on the 'Curious Life and Films of Alfred Hitchcock'. We had to rely on technology again in June, when due to an incident on the railway, our speaker Jane Gardiner was unable to attend and delivered, her lecture, 'The Sun King and the Court of Versailles' via Zoom.

Our season ended on a very different but entertaining note when we listened to, and watched Ian Keable, who performed simple tricks and enthralled us with the 'Art of Trickery: How Magicians are seen in Paintings, Prints and Cartoons'.

I attended Directory Day in London during March, along with a member of the Programme Team, where we were able to hear and meet many of the approved lecturers on the Arts Society list. This was an excellent day and enabled us to select lecturers for our forthcoming programme.

We must thank everyone at Lowther Pavilion for welcoming us throughout the year, with special thanks to the technical team, who enabled us to enjoy our talks when our Lecturers could not be with us in person.

It has been pleasing to see so many members at our meetings and we have also welcomed many visitors throughout the year.

The Programme Team have been very busy selecting speakers for our 2025/26 season, and I am grateful for their support as they bring fresh ideas to our programme.

Thankfully, Lesley Jarvis has filled the void left by Christine and the committee thank her for her assistance. The raffle monies continue to pay for craft materials for the Children's Ward at Blackpool Victoria Hospital and Brian House Children's Hospice.

There is further sad news in that Denise Malpas, who for many years provided the annual lecture programme, has died. Denise worked tirelessly to ensure the calibre of the monthly lecture programme provided to members was not only the best available, but the most diverse. Denise was keen to open up members' vision in relation to what could be construed as art; furthermore, she was instrumental in increasing members' expectation in relation to the content and delivery of the monthly lectures. Denise set 'the blue print' of expectation and her sound advice and quiet motivation, will be much missed by all.

#### **Communications**

After last year's spike in website visitor numbers, this last 12 months has seen slower growth – but the trend is still upwards. To save printing costs, we are continuing with a paperless policy wherever possible, with members being pointed to our website to download and print whatever they need. All the leaflets accompanying each lecture are on the site, as are booking forms; our biannual newsletter, *In The Picture*, is only sent out to members in an electronic format.

Email is our primary method of communication, and we still use the free basic service from Mailchimp to send out news of events, upcoming lectures and any other news items we wish to inform members about. A few members don't use email, so occasionally we need to rely on phone calls and the post to contact them. Usage of our social media account on Facebook is still growing slowly. It provides a good platform for reaching a wider audience and when asked, a small number of visitors have said that they saw news about the lecture on Facebook. The Committee makes use of WhatsApp, to communicate with each other. The Lowther includes all our forthcoming lectures on

its website and in its printed brochure, which provides us with extensive publicity over a large area and is probably responsible for the increase in the number of visitors we have had this year.

Thanks to those members who have submitted items for this year's newsletters; we very much appreciate your contributions, and we know from feedback that members enjoy reading about other members' interests. Thanks also to Tony Depledge for creating the monthly lecture notes leaflets; Hilary Cresswell for agreeing to help maintain the archive; and to Simon Foster for his help in the design of the newsletters.
